For example, pupils have completed material, mental and physical acts of service following the example of people of faith and have inspired lower school pupils to be courageous advocates in the world.

We follow the Liverpool Diocesan programme of study at KS5 to ensure we teach to the curriculum balance of 2/3s Christianity and Anglican tradition and 1/3 Other principle religions.
