Tasks for Y11 Students moving to A-level Art, Craft and Design.

TASK 1

WHERE SHOULD I START?

Consider the following questions and write an introduction to your Summer Project Sketchbook:

- What do you already enjoy about Art?
- What subjects or themes in Art are you most passionate about? What is it about this subject matter that is interesting? Why?
- Can you tell us about any particular artists/styles or genres that you can relate to?
- Are there any particular techniques that you already enjoy using?
- Tell us about a particularly memorable exhibition or gallery you have been to, what you saw and what were the most memorable pieces there and why.
- Let us know what you are looking forward to once you start the course and why.

TASK 2

SCULPTURE, ASSEMBLAGE & COLLAGE

- Look at the work of artist **Joseph Cornell**
- Gather a variety of objects or ephemera that suggest a time, place or emotion of your choice
- What can you use to put your objects in?

Cardboard packaging? Newspaper? An old book? An old jam jar?

A small drawer or box? A matchbox? An old fish tank that no one wants!

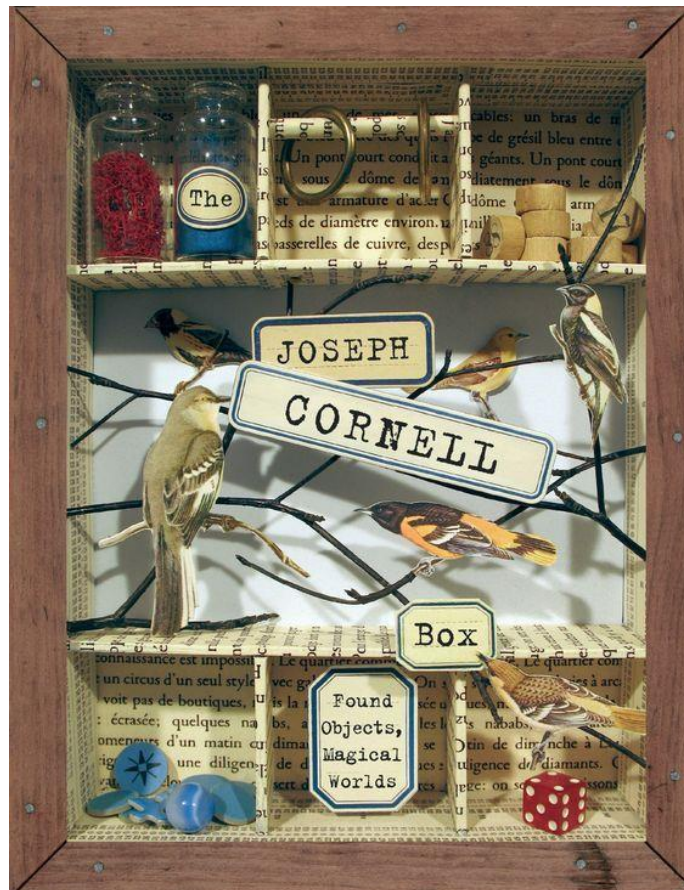
- What can you use to join things together?

- **Task:** Create a collaged portrait.

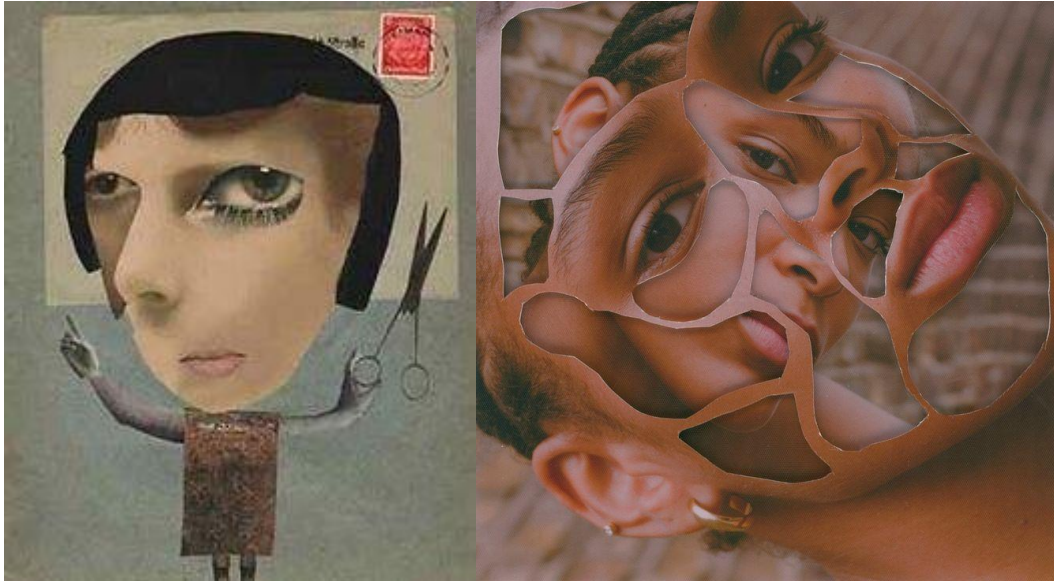
Consider strange combinations of scale and colour. Use photographs and pictures from magazines/internet/newspapers etc.

- **Task:** Create images by cutting out figures.

Could you use old photographs that someone has lying around in an old box? Or pictures from a magazine?

TASK 4

PORTRAITURE.

Research Portraits and find a variety of different styles you like and dislike – Pinterest is a really good tool

for inspiration or maybe take a Gallery tour online?

Print the images you find, create a mood board and make notes on your thoughts and feelings towards these pieces;

- Do you like/dislike the work? Why?
- What materials have been used?
- How has the artist used Visual Language? (What is the artist trying to communicate through the artwork – what is the work about?)

It is really important that you are able to analyse artwork and show how you may be able to use your findings to build your own ideas and concepts.

TASK 6

PORTRAITURE.

Have a go at some portraits yourself. Look at the Rules of facial proportion and practise. Practise really does make perfect – we will be pushing you for accuracy when we start in September so practising now will really help.

Really study your face, draw what you see – not what you want to see – don't stylise and over exaggerate.

Draw the wrinkles and lines, draw the slightly wonky nose, the freckles, draw our beautiful imperfections.

It may help to start off by drawing just the facial features separately slowly building towards drawing a whole face. Start off with outlines and proportions, build up to tone (concentrating on range of tone, contrast and directional shading) then experiment with other materials you have at home. If you are struggling for materials, you could make your own pigments by drawing with coffee, beetroot water or use your pencil sharpening's to make black ink by adding a little water.

Look at the work of **Jenny Saville**, she doesn't hide her subjects' imperfections.
